

## Mark Tushnet

**M**ARK TUSHNET is Carmack Waterhouse Professor of Constitutional Law at the Georgetown University Law Center Center.

He received his undergraduate degree magna cum laude from Harvard College in 1967. He received a J.D. and M.A. in history from Yale University in 1971. He clerked for Judge George Edwards and Justice Thurgood Marshall before beginning to teach at the University of Wisconsin Law School in 1973. In 1981 he moved to the Georgetown University Law Center. He has been a visiting professor at the University of Texas, University of Southern California, University of Chicago, and Columbia University law schools.



Professor Tushnet is the co-author of four casebooks, including the most widely used casebook on constitutional law, *Constitutional Law* (with Stone, Seidman, and Sunstein) . He has written nine books, including a two-volume work on the life of Justice Thurgood Marshall, and edited three others. He has received fellowships from the Rockefeller Humanities Program, the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, and the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation, and has written numerous articles on constitutional law and legal history. He is currently serving on the Executive Committee of the Association of American Law Schools.
